Amherst Early Music Online Squarcialupi Codex

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The **Squarcialupi Codex** (Florence, MS Mediceo Palatino 87) is an illuminated manuscript compiled in Florence in the early fifteenth century. It is named after the noted fifteenth-century organist Antonio Squarcialupi, who owned it.

The Squarcialupi Codex is the single largest primary source of secular polyphonic music of the trecento. It consists of 216 parchment folios, organized by composer, with each composer's section beginning with a portrait of the composer richly illuminated in gold, red, blue and purple. The illuminated portraits of the musicians are attributed to Lorenzo Monaco and his circle.

The Squarcialupi Codex uses elements of both French ars nova style and Italian trecento style notation side by side. We will try to tease out and retrace some of these "parallel" notation cultures as they were fluidly merging at the outgoing fourteenth/early fifteenth century in Florence.
